West Sussex Life Data 2017-2019

West Sussex has higher employment rates than the South East. 13 out of every 100 people are self-employed.

Small is beautiful. West Sussex is known as a Small Firm Economy, because most businesses in West Sussex employ fewer than 10 people.

More women work part-time than men, although things are changing, with numbers of men working part time going up.

Lancing Business Park Business occupancy data

June 2015- September 2022.

Lancing Business Park Business Improvement District (LBP BID) was established in 2008.

They regularly review how much employment space is occupied and how much is available. Today <u>Lancing Business Park</u> has an occupancy rate of 99.4%.

250 businesses and 3000 employees are based on the park.

It is the 2nd largest business area in West Sussex!

Businesses are varied, from well-known brands to small start-ups. As a community, the businesses have charity golf days and they have provided a Defibrillator network that covers the whole business park.

Ideas Alliance 'Our place, our map -Lancing', February 2022 In April 2022, 12 out of 90 units were vacant along the high street. A more recent walkabout on 18th August 2022 counted 20 vacant lots along the high street.

Ideas Alliance found existing bus routes and toilet facilities limit how much time people can spend on Lancing high street.

In 2012 there was higher footfall in North Street than South Street, with more vacant businesses in South Street.

This difference between the health of North Street vs South Street was remarked upon by long-standing business owners and volunteers in charity shops when Ideas Alliance took to the high street to talk to people in 2021.

"It feels like every shop is a social hub" (Resident and volunteer in a charity shop)

"People drop by to say hello all the time" (Resident and manager of a funeral service)

"Shops round here really look after each other" (Owner of a business)

Sometimes these spaces are used as "third spaces" – communal spaces that aren't home or work, but which lead to conversations with strangers and new friendships.
