Adur & Worthing Local Walking & Cycling Infrastructure Plan National data shows a big reason (bigger than going to work or to school) people move about their local areas is to go shopping and for leisure.

The seafront cycle path is one of the most popular in West Sussex!

The Cycling and Walking Strategy 2017- 2024 for the South Downs National Park aims for it to become easily reached from all communities within and near to the National Park and is well connected to public transport. A consultation with residents and community groups mapped out a suggested network of walking and cycling routes. One connects Sompting and the Seafront (route 312) and one connects Sompting and Brooklands Park (313)

Monks Rec plans

Lancing Parish Council is responsible for a number of open spaces and outdoor facilities as well as a Parish Hall and two sports pavilions.

Adur Council is also responsible for some open spaces.

The Parish Council has identified areas for improvement in both indoor and outdoor provision.

Plans to improve Monks Rec are underway, using local insights to create plans.

Open spaces have been ranked lower quality than in Worthing and Shoreham-by-Sea.

The Adur & Worthing Climate Assembly Recommendations

2020

Each recommendation received over 75% support among 45 randomly selected local people who came together over 5 weekends in 2020 to discuss how to tackle climate change whilst helping the area to thrive. Recommendation 2 was to "establish a plan for a network of small community growing spaces, focussed on food production and tackling food poverty."

Recommendation 6 was to "develop New Salts Farm and Brooklands as centres of excellence, educating and engaging residents and schools around key themes, e.g. growing, pollination and biodiversity, recycling, energy use, reducing plastics, sustainability".
